COMMITTEE DUTIES AND BACKGROUND

Mr. Brady A. Larson, Assistant Legislative Budget Analyst and Auditor, Legislative Council, presented a background memorandum entitled <u>Interim Senate Appropriations Committee - Background Memorandum</u>. He noted:

The committee has been assigned the following duties:

Review proposals to use funding from the State Fiscal Recovery Fund established through the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 and develop recommendations for the use of funds.

Review legislative appropriations from the federal Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund and recommend any necessary changes to existing appropriations from the fund and develop recommendations regarding the use of any remaining available funding.

Consider any other budget adjustments requiring legislation necessary before the 2023 regular legislative session.

- The committee is to reconcile any differences in recommendations with the Interim Senate Appropriations
 Committee and work with the Legislative Council staff to prepare a bill draft implementing the
 recommendations for submission to the Legislative Management meeting on November 1, 2021.
- Legislative leadership established guidelines for the interim appropriations committees as they consider budget proposals. The guidelines are as follows:

The proposal must be for a one-time purpose.

Only proposals that must receive funding authorization before the 2023 regular legislative session should be considered. All other proposals should be considered during the 2023 regular legislative session.

Proposals should not appropriate funding from the general fund or the strategic investment and improvements fund.

All proposals received will be considered and the interim appropriations committees are to build their recommendations from a starting point of zero.

• Funding available from the federal State Fiscal Recovery Fund totals \$1,007,502,515. Funding available from the federal Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund totals \$113,276,228.

ADJUSTMENT OF FEDERAL FUNDING SOURCES OF SELECTED PROJECTS

Mr. Larson presented a bill draft [21.1108.01000] regarding adjusting the funding source of selected projects that received federal funding during the 2021 regular legislative session. He noted the bill draft:

- Adjusts the funding source for various projects approved by the 2021 Legislative Assembly from the federal Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund to the federal State Fiscal Recovery Fund.
- Identifies \$317 million appropriated in House Bill No. 1395 (2021) as from the federal State Fiscal Recovery Fund, of which at least \$200 million is for state road and bridge projects, up to \$100 million is for county bridge projects, and \$17 million is for townships.
