ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL NO. 1013

1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of  
2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision  
3 services - school for the blind; to amend and reenact sections 15.1-02-02, 15.1-02-16,  
4 15.1-06-19, and 15.1-27-16 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the salary of the  
5 superintendent of public instruction, credentialing, school counselors, and administrative cost-  
6 sharing for cooperating districts; to provide for a transfer; to provide an exemption; to provide for  
7 a legislative management study; to provide for reports; ~~and to provide an expiration date;~~ and to  
8 declare an emergency.

9 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:**

10 **SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION.** The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds  
11 as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state  
12 treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and  
13 other income, to the department of public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf,  
14 and North Dakota vision services - school for the blind for the purpose of defraying the  
15 expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30,  
16 2023, as follows:

23 The 2021-23 biennium one-time funding amounts are not part of the entity's base budget for  
 24 the 2023-25 biennium. The department of public instruction, school for the deaf, and North  
 25 Dakota vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees of the  
 26 sixty-eighth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium beginning  
 27 July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

28 **SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT.** The sum of \$433,020,000,  
 29 included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is  
 30 from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund  
 31 that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of

1 public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30,  
2 2023.

3 **SECTION 4. ESTIMATED INCOME - FOUNDATION AID STABILIZATION FUND.** The  
4 estimated income line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes the sum of  
5 ~~\$110,000,000~~\$143,454,500 from the foundation aid stabilization fund for integrated formula  
6 payments.

7 **SECTION 5. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION**  
8 **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may  
9 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education  
10 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act for paying grants for educational  
11 services that were due in the 2019-21 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly  
12 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2021. To be reimbursed under this  
13 section, claims must be properly supported and filed with the superintendent of public  
14 instruction by June 30, 2022.

15 **SECTION 6. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM**~~**-MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING-**~~  
16 ~~**DISTRIBUTION.**~~

17 ~~—1.—~~The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in  
18 subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts or special  
19 education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an application that is  
20 approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the superintendent of public instruction. The  
21 superintendent of public instruction shall encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented  
22 programs among school districts and special education units.

23 ~~—2.—~~~~State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of~~  
24 ~~matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for~~  
25 ~~students participating in the Medicaid program. Special education funds equal to the~~  
26 ~~amount of the matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special~~  
27 ~~education unit must be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the~~  
28 ~~department of human services on behalf of the school district or unit.~~

29 **SECTION 7. MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING - SCHOOL APPROVAL - WITHHOLDING**  
30 **AND DISTRIBUTION.**

- 1       1. State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of  
2       matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for  
3       students participating in the Medicaid program for the biennium beginning July 1,  
4       2021, and ending June 30, 2023. Special education funds equal to the amount of the  
5       matching funds required to be paid by the school district or special education unit must  
6       be paid by the superintendent of public instruction to the department of human  
7       services on behalf of the school district or unit.
- 8       2. State school aid payments for integrated formula payments must be reduced by the  
9       amount of funds required to be paid by school districts for school approval for the  
10      biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023.

11      **SECTION 8. TRANSPORTATION GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.**

- 12      1. During each year of the 2021-23 biennium, the superintendent of public instruction  
13      shall calculate the payment to which each school district is entitled based on the state  
14      transportation formula as it existed on June 30, 2001, except that the superintendent  
15      shall provide reimbursement at the rate of:
  - 16      a. One dollar and eleven cents per mile for schoolbuses having a capacity of ten or  
17      more passengers;
  - 18      b. Fifty-two cents per mile for vehicles having a capacity of nine or fewer  
19      passengers;
  - 20      c. Fifty cents per mile, provided:
    - 21      (1) The student being transported is a student with a disability, as defined in  
22      chapter 15.1-32;
    - 23      (2) The student's individualized education program plan requires that the  
24      student attend a public or a nonpublic school located outside the student's  
25      school district of residence;
    - 26      (3) The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;
    - 27      (4) The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;
    - 28      (5) The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents; and
    - 29      (6) The reimbursement does not exceed two round trips daily between the  
30      student's home and school.
  - 31      d. Fifty cents per mile, one way, provided:



- 1 (1) The student being transported resides more than two miles from the public
- 2 school that the student attends;
- 3 (2) The student is transported by an adult member of the student's family;
- 4 (3) The student is transported in a vehicle furnished by the student's parents;
- 5 and
- 6 (4) The student's transportation is paid for by the student's parents.
- 7 e. Thirty cents per student for each one-way trip.
- 8 2. The superintendent of public instruction shall use the latest available student
- 9 enrollment count in each school district in applying the provisions of subsection 1.
- 10 3. This section does not authorize the reimbursement of any costs incurred in providing
- 11 transportation for student attendance at extracurricular activities or events.

12 **SECTION 9. CONDITION ON APPROPRIATION FOR GRANTS - PROGRAM AND**

13 **PASSTHROUGH LINE ITEM.** The appropriation in the grants - program and passthrough line  
14 item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act is conditioned on the superintendent of public  
15 instruction not using federal funds to defray the expenses of the following programs for which  
16 state funding is provided in this line item for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending  
17 June 30, 2023:

- 18 1. Adult education matching grants;
- 19 2. School food services matching grants;
- 20 3. Program grant pool; and
- 21 4. Mentoring program.

22 **SECTION 10. REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS - GRANTS - DISTRIBUTION.**

23 The integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes  
24 \$500,000 from the general fund for the purpose of providing annual grants to regional education  
25 associations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and ending June 30, 2023. An annual  
26 grant of \$35,714 is provided to each regional education association that exists as of July 1,  
27 2021. Regional education associations that merge during the 2021-23 biennium are entitled to  
28 the annual grants that would have been paid to each of the member associations.

29 ~~—SECTION 10. EXEMPTION – INDIRECT COST ALLOCATION. Notwithstanding section-~~  
30 ~~54-44.1-15, the department of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its-~~  
31 ~~operating account.~~

1     **SECTION 11. POSTSECONDARY TRANSITIONAL GRANT PROGRAM FUNDING.** The  
2 integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act includes funding  
3 for postsecondary transitional grants. The superintendent of public instruction shall provide  
4 integrated formula payments to postsecondary transitional programs for eligible students  
5 enrolled in a postsecondary transitional program within the state at the rate provided under  
6 section 15.1-27-04.1. For purposes of this section, "eligible student" means a student with a  
7 documented intellectual or developmental disability who is at least eighteen years of age but  
8 has not reached the age of twenty-two, who has graduated from a public high school in the  
9 state or obtained an equivalent degree, and who enrolls in a postsecondary transitional  
10 program. By June thirtieth of each year, postsecondary transitional programs shall submit to the  
11 superintendent of public instruction for the reimbursement of eligible students enrolled in the  
12 program. Grant payments under this section may not exceed the per student rate under section  
13 15.1-27-04.1. The superintendent of public instruction shall review and approve postsecondary  
14 transitional programs and develop a system for the distribution of payments necessary to  
15 implement this section.

16     **SECTION 12. USE OF NEW MONEY - NONADMINISTRATIVE PERSONNEL**  
17 **COMPENSATION INCREASES - REPORT TO LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.**

- 18         1. During the 2021-23 biennium, the board of each school district shall use an amount  
19         equal to at least seventy percent of all new money received by the district, resulting  
20         from increases in the base integrated formula payment rate, to increase the  
21         compensation paid to non-administrative personnel.
- 22         2. For purposes of this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall provide  
23         guidance to school districts regarding the calculation of the amount of new money  
24         resulting from increases in the base integrated formula payment rate during the  
25         2021-23 biennium.

26     **SECTION 13. EXEMPTION - GENERAL EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FEES AND**  
27 **DISPLACED HOMEMAKER DEPOSITS.** Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-15, the department  
28 of public instruction may deposit indirect cost recoveries in its operating account. In addition,  
29 any moneys collected by the department of public instruction for general educational  
30 development fees and displaced homemakers deposits, must be deposited in the public

1 instruction fund in the state treasury ~~and may be spent~~. Any funds deposited in the public  
2 instruction fund may only be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.

3 **SECTION 14. EXEMPTION - TRANSFER - PUBLIC INSTRUCTION FUND.**

4 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies  
5 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in  
6 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019  
7 Session Laws, the lesser of ~~\$23,733,064~~\$23,887,064 or the remaining amount must be  
8 continued into the 2021-23 biennium and the office of management and budget shall transfer  
9 this amount into the public instruction fund for the purpose of providing program and  
10 passthrough grants as appropriated in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act.

11 **SECTION 15. EXEMPTION - DYSLEXIA SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM.**

12 Notwithstanding section 54-44.1-11, if, after the superintendent of public instruction complies  
13 with all statutory payment obligations imposed for the 2019-21 biennium, any moneys remain in  
14 the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019  
15 Session Laws, up to \$250,000 must be continued into the 2021-23 biennium for the purpose of  
16 defraying the expenses of the dyslexia screening pilot program.

17 **SECTION 16. EXEMPTION - STATE AUTOMATED REPORTING SYSTEM REWRITE.** Up  
18 to \$600,000 of the unexpended amount remaining from the one-time appropriation from the  
19 foundation aid stabilization fund for the state automated reporting system rewrite, as authorized  
20 in subdivision 1 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019 Session Laws, is not subject to the  
21 provisions of section 54-44.1-11 at the end of the 2019-21 biennium, and may be continued into  
22 the 2021-23 biennium for the purpose of continuing the state automated reporting system  
23 rewrite.

24 **SECTION 17. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES.** The grants line item in subdivision 2 of  
25 section 1 of this Act includes \$1,737,582 for aid to public libraries, of which no more than  
26 one-half may be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022.

27 **SECTION 18. EXEMPTION - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION**

28 **INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM DISTRIBUTION.** The \$40,000 appropriated for the  
29 purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher  
30 education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or  
31 hard of hearing in subdivision 3 of section 1 of chapter 38 of the 2019 Session Laws and any

1 funding continued for this purpose from prior bienniums is not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Any  
2 funds remaining must be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:

- 3 1. The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for  
4 which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on a uniform hourly  
5 reimbursement.
- 6 2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the  
7 deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the  
8 amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf  
9 or hard of hearing.
- 10 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amount  
11 appropriated during the first year of the biennium.
- 12 4. If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the  
13 deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the  
14 biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.
- 15 5. At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education,  
16 the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding  
17 the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.

29 The superintendent of public instruction may adopt rules governing the issuance of:

- 1 3. Credentials for elementary school principals;
- 2 4. Credentials for teachers of students who are emotionally disturbed;
- 3 5. Credentials for teachers of students who are gifted and talented;
- 4 6. Credentials for secondary school principals;
- 5 7. Credentials for library media;
- 6 8. Credentials for teachers of title I;
- 7 9. Credentials for teachers of students who have intellectual disabilities;
- 8 10. Credentials for teachers of students who are physically disabled;
- 9 11. Credentials for coordinators of programs for students with limited English proficiency;
- 10 12. Credentials for school counselors;
- 11 13. Credentials for special education directors;
- 12 14. Credentials for special education strategists;
- 13 15. Credentials for teachers of students who have specific learning disabilities;
- 14 16. Credentials for superintendents;
- 15 17. Credentials for teachers of students who have vision impairments;
- 16 18. Credentials for teachers of students who are deaf or hard of hearing;
- 17 19. Credentials for teachers of computer and cyber science; and
- 18 20. Certificate of completion for paraprofessionals; and
- 19 21. Certificate of completion for school health technicians.

20 **SECTION 21. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-06-19 of the North Dakota Century Code is  
21 amended and reenacted as follows:

22 **15.1-06-19. Counselor positions - Requirement.**

- 23 1. Beginning with the 2010-11 school year, each school district must have available one  
24 full-time equivalent school counselor for every three hundred students in grades seven  
25 through twelve.
- 26 2. Beginning with the 2022-23 school year, each school district must have available one  
27 full-time equivalent school counselor for every three hundred students in grades  
28 kindergarten through six.
- 29 ~~3. The duties of a school counselor under this section must include the academic~~

~~tests, providing short-term individual and group counseling sessions to students, presentation of age-appropriate school counseling lessons to students, interpreting student records, collaborating with teachers on building classroom connections, collaborating with school administration to identify student issues and needs, advocating for students, and analyzing disaggregated schoolwide data. The duties may not include assessment administration, clerical responsibilities, or other administrative duties.~~

2.4.3. Up to one-third of the full-time equivalency requirement established in subsection 1 may be met by career advisors.

3.5.4. For purposes of this section, a "career advisor" means an individual who holds a certificate in career development facilitation issued by the department of career and technical education under section 15-20.1-24 or an individual who is provisionally approved by the department of career and technical education under section 15-20.1-25 to serve as a career advisor.

**SECTION 22. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-16 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

**15.1-27-16. Per student payments - Administrative cost-sharing - Cooperating districts and special education units.**

1. If any school district receiving payments under this chapter cooperates with another school district for the joint provision of educational services under a plan approved by the superintendent of public instruction, the superintendent of public instruction shall, notwithstanding the provisions of section 15.1-27-03.2, create and assign a separate weighting factor that allows the cooperating districts to receive, for a period of four years, a payment rate equivalent to that which each district would have received had the cooperative plan not taken effect. The superintendent of public instruction shall compute the separate weighting factor to four decimal places and that weighting factor is effective for the duration of the cooperative plan.
2. A school district that is cooperating with another school district under a cooperative plan approved by the superintendent of public instruction, and which has taxable property located in the same city as the other school district under the cooperative plan, may not be required as part of the cooperative plan to:

1 a. Provide unduplicated grade level services; or

2 b. Share administrative personnel.

3 3. If any school district receiving payments under this chapter or any special education  
4 unit cooperates with another school district or special education unit to jointly employ  
5 both a superintendent and a business manager or to jointly employ both a special  
6 education unit director and a business manager, the superintendent of public  
7 instruction shall provide partial reimbursement of the combined salaries of the  
8 superintendent and the business manager or partial reimbursement of the combined  
9 salaries of the special education unit director and the business manager as follows:

10 a. If the combined salaries exceed three hundred thousand dollars, the amount of  
11 the reimbursement must be calculated based upon three hundred thousand  
12 dollars. Each cooperating school district or special education unit shall receive a  
13 prorated share of the reimbursement percentages listed below based on the  
14 percentage of full-time equivalency that the superintendent and business  
15 manager or the special education unit director and business manager are  
16 employed by each district or special education unit. The percentage of  
17 reimbursement for the combined salaries of the jointly hired superintendent and  
18 business manager or of the jointly hired special education unit director and  
19 business manager must be as follows:

20 (1) If two schools or special education units are cooperating, ten percent of the  
21 combined salaries;

22 (2) If three schools or special education units are cooperating, fifteen percent of  
23 the combined salaries;

24 (3) If four schools or special education units are cooperating, twenty percent of  
25 the combined salaries; and

26 (4) If five or more schools or special education units are cooperating,  
27 twenty-five percent of the combined salaries.

28 b. To be eligible for reimbursement under this subsection, the cooperating school  
29 districts or special education units must:

- 1                   (1) Have been approved by the superintendent of public instruction and have  
2                   implemented their administrative cost-sharing program after June 30, 2022;  
3                   and  
4                   (2) Submit the salaries of the superintendent and business manager or the  
5                   salaries of the special education unit director and business manager to the  
6                   superintendent of public instruction by June first of each year.

7                   **SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION**

8 **FUNDING.** During the 2021-22 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying the  
9 feasibility and desirability of using up to 1 percent of common schools trust fund assets annually  
10 for school construction grants. The legislative management shall report its findings and  
11 recommendations, together with any legislation necessary to implement the recommendations,  
12 to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

13                   **SECTION 24. LEARNING LOSS, ACCELERATED LEARNING RECOVERY, AND**  
14 **ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND - REPORT TO**

15 **LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT.** School districts receiving funds from the elementary and  
16 secondary school emergency relief fund shall provide two narrative summary reports to the  
17 superintendent of public instruction, including information regarding learning losses of students  
18 identified within the district, including subgroup gaps; school district plans to accelerate learning  
19 recovery for all students, including closing subgroup gaps; uses of elementary and secondary  
20 school emergency relief funds, including the percentage of those funds expended in categories  
21 determined by the superintendent of public instruction; and the impact elementary and  
22 secondary school emergency relief fund expenditures had on accelerating the learning recovery  
23 for the districts' students. The first school district report must be submitted to the superintendent  
24 of public instruction by December 1, 2021. An aggregated report must be presented by the  
25 superintendent of public instruction to the legislative management by June 1, 2022. The second  
26 school district report must be submitted to the superintendent of public instruction by  
27 December 1, 2022. An aggregated report must be presented by the superintendent of public  
28 instruction to the sixty-eighth legislative assembly.

29                   **SECTION 25. EXPIRATION DATE.** Section ~~19~~22 of this Act is effective through June 30,  
30 2024, and after that date is ineffective.

2 relief fund, of which \$6,565,432 is in the operating expenses line item and \$5,434,568 is in the
