RE: Senate Bill 2153

Chair Lee and Senate Human Services Committee members, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB 2153. I am Genny Dienstmann with the ND Association of Counties. I also served as a member of the ND Health Council from 2013 through May 2021 and was Chair of the ND Health Council from November 2017 through November 2020.

During my tenure on the Health Council, we handled a number of issues, including updating TENORM rules, creating/passing administrative rules for medical marijuana and creating core functions for a public health unit. Unfortunately I, along with many others who worked on these core functions, were not aware they were not approved in Administrative Rules .

It is important to note, the Health Council worked directly with the ND Department Health staff and Local Public Health Units to create these core functions. There was full support from everyone involved and public input was also requested. We made a concerted effort that no additional responsibilities would be added to the core functions, so existing health units would not have to implement new services.

These core functions were brought to the full Health Council for review and approval, which passed unanimously. They were then forwarded to the ND Attorney General's Office for legal review and approval to be included in the Administrative Rules under the Department of Health.

It was brought to my attention during the 2021 legislative session, there was no clear definition of the core functions of a public health unit. After inquiring with the ND Department of Health and the Attorney General's Office, I was informed the rules exceeded the Department of Health's authority and therefore were not approved.

Chair Lee and committee members, I strongly support SB 2153 as written as it affirms what the Health Council intended to do in 2016/2017 when creating the core functions for a public health unit.

Chair Weisz and House Human Services Committee members, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in support of SB 2153. I am Genny Dienstmann with the ND Association of Counties. I also served as a member of the ND Health Council from 2013 through 2021 and was Chair of the ND Health Council from November 2017 through November 2020.

During my tenure on the ND Health Council, we were responsible for creating and/or passing a variety of administrative rules including medical marijuana, TENORM and creating/defining core functions of a public health unit. The Health Council worked directly with the ND Department Health staff and Local Public Health administrators to create these core functions as there was no clear definition in administrative rules or state statute that provided this definition. There was full support from all parties involved and public input was requested. We made certain no additional responsibilities would be included in these core functions so that existing health units would meet all requirements once passed.

These core functions were brought to the full Health Council for review and approval, which passed unanimously. They were then forwarded to the ND Attorney General's Office for legal review and approval to be included in the Administrative Rules under the Department of Health. Unfortunately, I, along with many others who worked on these core functions, were not aware they weren't approved in Administrative Rules in 2017.

During the 2021 legislative session, it was brought to my attention there was no clear definition of core functions of a public health unit. After inquiring with the ND Department of Health and ND Attorney General's Office, I was informed the rules exceeded the Department of Health's authority and therefore were not approved back in 2017.

Chair Weisz and committee members, I strongly support SB 2153 as written as it affirms what the ND Health Council, along with our health partners, intended to do in 2017 when defining the core functions for a public health unit.

Good morning, Chairman Weisz and members of the House Human Services Committee. My name is Theresa Will. I am the Administrator at City-County Health District (CCHD) in Valley City. Our agency provides public health services for the citizens of Barnes County.

Many years ago (in 2001 I believe), it was determined that all land in North Dakota would be in a public health unit. At that time, there was much to be learned about public health, which may have been the reason that core functions were not included in century code at that time.

Local Public Health (LPH) works closely with community partners, such as hospitals and clinics to complete Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNA). Critical Access Hospitals are required, by law, to complete a CHNA every 3 years. In Barnes County CCHD works jointly with CHI Mercy Hospital to complete this assessment which involves surveying community members and looking at local data, then determining local gaps and needs. A Community Health Improvement plan based upon the assessment, is put in place and shared widely throughout the community. Availability of mental health services, youth drug use/abuse, youth depression/anxiety and not enough jobs with livable wages were noted in our 2021 CHNA.

Although public health continues to evolve and change as the science supports change, there are specific functions that should be required of each local public health unit. Providing the core functions listed within this bill, assures the public that every citizen will have access to a set of base services. All local public health units currently provide these core services and then augment those services to serve their communities most appropriately.
