Item Description

FTE positions - The 2021 Legislative Assembly authorized 164 FTE positions, a decrease of 1 FTE position from the 2019-21 biennium authorized level of 165 FTE positions. The Legislative Assembly transferred 1 FTE position to the Information Technology Department for IT unification.

Aquatic nuisance species program - The Legislative Assembly, in Senate Bill No. 2293 (2019), established a surcharge on fishing and hunting licenses and increased the fee on motorboat licenses to provide funding for an aquatic nuisance species program fund. The 2021 Legislative Assembly appropriated \$1,509,009 from the aquatic nuisance species program fund to the Game and Fish Department, for the purpose of administering aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs for the 2021-23 biennium.

Shooting sports grant program - The Legislative Assembly appropriated \$250,000, of which \$245,000 is from Pittman-Robertson federal funds deposited in the game and fish fund and \$5,000 is from the game and fish fund, for the shooting sports grant program during the 2021-23 biennium.

Funding for Parks and Recreation Department - The Legislative Assembly appropriated \$122,000 from the game and fish fund for a grant to the Parks and Recreation Department for state park boat ramp maintenance and improvements.

Private land open to sportsmen (PLOTS) program - The Legislative Assembly appropriated \$19.98 million for land habitat and deer depredation funding for the 2021-23 biennium, of which \$13.2 million is estimated to be used for landowner payments.

Status/Result

The FTE position was transferred to the Information Technology Department on July 1, 2021.

Through April 2022, \$630,053 has been expended for use in aquatic nuisance species education, inspection, and monitoring programs under North Dakota Century Code Chapter 20.1-17. Through April 2022, the aquatic nuisance species fund has received deposits of \$340,279 collected from a surcharge on fishing and hunting licenses and increased fees on motorboat licenses.

Through April 2022, the Game and Fish Department has committed \$247,603, of which \$242,603 is for various shooting organizations, and \$5,000 is for various new clay target school startup programs.

These funds are granted to the Parks and Recreation Department on a reimbursement basis and as of April 30, 2022, no reimbursements have been requested.

Radio equipment replacement - The Legislative Assembly appropriated \$801,500 of one-time funding from the game and fish fund for replacement of radio equipment.

The department has purchased all of the new radios and through April 2022, installation of the radios in vehicles and boats is approximately 50 percent complete. The funding provided was sufficient.
