An agency adult foster home is defined in North Dakota Century Code chapter 50-11, Foster Care for Children and Adults, as a residential home in which services for Medicaid eligible adults is regularly provided by professional staff, to four or fewer adults who are not related by blood or marriage to the owner or lessee, for hire or compensation.

Agency providers who wish to develop agency adult foster homes in North Dakota must adhere to all state law and city ordinances that may apply, including city zoning ordinances. Because this setting is relatively new, and the current law does not include any language about zoning, there have been some questions raised about how these homes fit into local zoning ordinances.
